The Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Sloan School of Management states, "We will consider candidates without undergraduate degrees... if they have demonstrated exceptional capabilities through other endeavors."

Executive MBA - UK

The Ducere Executive MBA, awarded by one of the UK's, allows for entry with a minimum of 5 years management or leadership experience. Admission requires real world management, as well as third party letters of recommendation. Experience can include leading teams, managing projects, running a business, or holding key decision making roles.







Executive MBA (EMBA) Consideration:

EMBA programs are designed for mid-career professionals who may not hold a formal degree but possess substantial industry expertise. The University of Washington's Foster School of Business notes that "a few non-degreed EMBA applicants with outstanding work experience may be considered each year."



VIU and Rome

An advanced MBA certified in the EU by both Valencia International University and Rome Business School, offers specialist MBA's in global business as well as Artificial Intelligence. Alternative entry is based on demonstrated management experience and third party recommendations.







Professional Certifications and Credentials

Certain professional qualifications can act as substitutes for a bachelor's degree in MBA admissions, including:

- Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA)
- Certified Public Accountant (CPA)
- Project Management Professional (PMP)
- Six Sigma Certification
